As a volunteer chaplain, I spent time talking to inmates. Many were repeat offenders, following in the footsteps of fathers who had also been in and out of prison. They were haunted by the fear that their sons would continue the cycle.

dren. Or the little girl who was sexually abused, turned to drugs to numb her pain, sold her body to pay for the drugs, and eventually took her own life. Were they both destined for hell, for things they couldn't control?

Then I considered the Holocaust. Millions of Jews were tortured and killed, and Christian teaching suggests that they're now in hell alongside Hitler. That didn't sit right with me.

We talked a lot about making good choices, but the truth was, they didn't have the tools or the foundation to make better decisions. It seemed inevitable – they'd end up right back where they started. Watching this pattern, I began to ask deeper questions: *Why does God let Satan keep winning? Why does He allow generation after generation to be trapped and destroyed, only to end up in hell?*

So much of what we do – how we believe and behave – is shaped by where we're born, how we're raised, and what we know. How is it fair to punish someone forever for things they never had the power to change?

Then, that got me wondering: *Does hell even make sense?*

The more I thought about it, the more I realized how absurd it seemed that saving souls was left up to us. After 2,000 years, it hasn't gone so well. Take a min-

istry in India, for example, striving to reach a million kids for Jesus. It's an incredible goal, but it represents only 0.0714% of the population. Is everyone else doomed?

And what about unconditional love? Can it really be unconditional if there are conditions attached? If Jesus died for all sin, why would eternal punishment still exist for anyone? If God's ultimate plan is to fix everything, how does eternal torment fit into that?

Hell just didn't make sense anymore. It seemed like a terrible, nonsensical idea.

But logic alone wasn't enough for me. I needed answers. So, I dug into the Bible – reading different translations, studying the original languages, and devouring books on the topic.

I won't bore you with all the theological details – you can find plenty of resources for that; but here's what I discovered: my deepest questions lined up with Scripture. God isn't cruel. He's love – our Father – and He's in control.

What I came to realize was this: Life isn't a test, it's

preparation. **Eternal torture? That's a human invention, not God's plan.**

God's purpose is to restore *everything* – not just people but all creation – back to Himself. Nothing will be wasted. Everything will be made right, and no one will be left out. As my friend Dean Wilkinson says, "No one is being cheated."

The pain and suffering we experience now will eventually give way to something beautiful – a display of God's infinite love and power.

God is love. Real love doesn't operate through fear or punishment. In the end, everything will be good. All will be well.

The salvation of all? It doesn't just make sense – it's the only thing that truly does.

Everything starts with God, moves through God, and returns to God. Always. **BSN**

There are enormous amounts of prophecy that were given to Israel in the Hebrew Scriptures that are yet to be fulfilled. Most believers simply follow some version of Christendom's eschatology, futilely attempting to force the enormity of Israel's prophetic scene into a few extremely abridged time periods. From this shallow vantage point, it is believed that more time has passed in God's ages than remains. This couldn't be further from the truth. Multiplied millennia remain, more than have yet transpired, for the fulfillment of all of the glorious plans that God has revealed in His Word. Far from being near the "end" of something prophetic, the span of God's eonian plan is immense, and our placement is early in its timeline. Much more of God's prophetic program remains than man's feeble eschatologies allow.

The intention herein is to present an alternative view to the confusing message of the traditional Evangelical concept of prophecy, thus opening the door to a consideration of the idea of a Pre-millennial Kingdom as the fulfillment of many of God's promises to Israel to have their kingdom in the Earth.

All of the material in this book, taken together, is a wonderful resolution to the confusion of the conventional religious theology that has muddled the minds of sincere Bible students for centuries. While we may live in the Secret Administration, that doesn't necessarily mean that God's Word regarding His plans for Israel must be a mystery to us.

My dad was a good father and a great provider. We never had to worry about having enough food, and our home was always comfortable. We took great vacations – one memorable trip was driving a car and trailer all the way to Guatemala. I worked in the family business, and my parents' love for each other created a sense of security for us kids.

But like all parents, my dad wasn't perfect. We grew up in a very conservative and strict Mennonite community, with lots of rules to follow. I'll admit, I was a bit of a handful as a kid and teenager, and I didn't care much for all of the rules. This caused tension between me and my dad, especially as I got older. He was strict about who I spent time with, how I dressed, what music I listened to, and where I went. I was often punished – spankings when I was little and more restrictions as I got older.

We went to church constantly, and at one point, I was even sent to Bible school to “straighten me out.” This dynamic continued into my adult life, especially after my wife and I began to move away from the strict lifestyle we were raised in. My dad often reminded me how “worldly” and “liberal” I'd become, insisting I was on the wrong path. Even a month before he died, he was still telling me how wrong I was.

It was clear that I was a disappointment to him.

For years, I carried a grudge. I was angry that my teenage years felt so restricted. I didn't get to experience life like many of my peers. I was hurt that my dad couldn't accept me for who I was. As I grew older, I felt sad that we couldn't have open, honest conversations or a close father-son relationship.

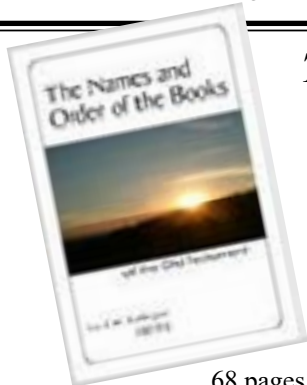
I tried to excuse his behavior, knowing that he had experienced the same things with his own father. I could even feel some compassion for him, but the resentment lingered.

Since his death, I've slowly grown more appreciative of my dad. But the real breakthrough came recently.

Clyde Pilkington and I were having a conversation for the *Freedom Journey* podcast. We talked about how every circumstance – good and bad – comes from God. Our loving Father has written our life stories, and they all end in perfection. Every detail, even the painful ones, serves a purpose and is ultimately for our good.

As we discussed relationships, Clyde said something that struck me deeply: The hurtful things that people say and do aren't really from them. They're caused by

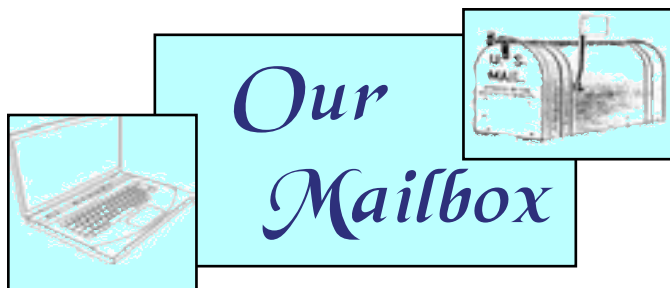
It will be seen at once that the information contained between the covers of this work is of vital importance as fundamental knowledge for the Bible Student.

The Writings of Alan Burns

by — Alan Burns (1884-1929)

Alan Burns was born 1884 in Philadelphia, PA, but spent his youth in Ireland, where he was associated with the Salvation Army and the Plymouth Brethren. At about twenty-one years of age he went to New York City. Being an earnest seeker after truth and a student of the Scriptures, he became interested in the teaching of Dr. E.W. Bullinger (1837-1913), and was strongly attracted to Vladimir Gelesnoff (1877-1921), when he began his ministry in New York. Gelesnoff considered him the best gospel preacher he had ever heard. With the help of a few friends who did the printing, Burns started *Grace and Glory*, a little magazine which gave promise of much good. For lack of support, it languished and soon ceased, to be followed, not long afterwards, by *Unsearchable Riches*, which virtually took its place. Burns became a valued contributor to the earlier volumes of *Unsearchable Riches*. The logical and powerful introductory articles in A.E. Knoch's (1874-1965) book *All in All* were written by him.

Today, I no longer feel any resentment toward my dad. As I look past my dad, to see God's hand in our relationship, I can see how my heavenly Father used him to shape me into the person I am today and who I'm becoming.

My dad did have a deep love for studying the Scriptures, and he passed that passion on to me.

I know some people have had far more difficult relationships with their fathers, and I don't want to minimize that pain. I encourage you to look past your earthly father to your heavenly Father. He loves you more than anyone else does, and uses life's pressures to mold you into the person He planned for you to be.
