Romans 5:20 declares a shocking truth: “Where sin increases, grace superexceeds” Let that sink in. The worse the sin, the more grace abounds. You can sin as much as you want, and grace will still cover it. You cannot out-sin grace.

Here's the kicker: there would be no grace without sin. Christianity often glosses over this reality, avoiding Romans 5:20 like it's a pothole in their perfect theology. They argue this message gives people a “license to sin.” But think about it: have you ever needed a license to sin? No one does. We all sin constantly, whether or not we believe in hell.¹

The truth is, humanity was designed to fail. We were subjected to vanity, and sin is woven into the fabric of our lives. But Christianity keeps rolling out its “How to Stop Sinning” programs, as if grace is a backup plan for those who didn't follow the steps. This misses the point entirely.

Grace isn't a plan B. It's *THE plan*.

GOD WROTE THE SCRIPT

Here's something even more foundational: God wrote your life before you were born. Every moment, every success, and yes, every failure was scripted by Him. That means your sins, as much as they grieve you,



were written into the story by the same God who delights in you.

If that makes you uncomfortable, consider this: if God is sovereign, He's sovereign over everything – including your sin. Your failures are not surprises to Him. They're not curveballs disrupting His plan. They're *part of the plan*.

In fact, your failures are His failures in the sense that He caused them and placed them in the story for His purposes. Why? To keep you humble, to remind you of your need for Him, and to demonstrate His incredible grace. When we fail, it's an opportunity for His love to shine even brighter.

The beauty of this truth is that it removes the crushing burden of guilt and shame. You're not a broken cog in the machine. You're a beloved child, living out the life that God carefully crafted for you. And because He's the Author, you can rest in the assurance that nothing – not even your worst mistakes – can derail His plan.

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THE FOUNDATION OF TOTAL FREEDOM

If we are ever going to truly live in freedom, we must grasp this basic truth: *grace has no limits*. The depth of this truth changes everything. Until we understand that grace is bigger than sin – *any* sin – we will always live with guilt and fear in the back of our minds.

Think about it: if there's a limit to grace, we're never really free. We're always walking on eggshells, afraid of crossing some invisible line where God's patience runs out. But that's not the God of the Bible. Grace is limitless because God's love is limitless. Once you realize that, you're free: Free from guilt. Free from shame. Free from the exhausting need to perform, to measure up, to earn His favor.

When this truth settles into your heart, you can live without fear – without wondering if you've done enough, been good enough, or prayed hard enough to keep God on your side.

TRANSFORMATION THROUGH LOVE, NOT FEAR

Once you stop living in fear of hell, you can begin to live in the love of God. It's amazing how love changes you. When you experience God's grace and love, you suddenly find that you *don't want* to rob banks, cheat on your spouse, or lie to your neighbor. The transformation comes not because you're scared of hellfire, but because you're overwhelmed by love.

And the journey doesn't end there. Even our sins – the moments we miss the mark – bring Him glory. They humble us and remind us of our need for Him. Sin doesn't destroy your relationship with God; it only changes what *you* think He thinks about you. But here's

the good news: His thoughts about you never change. He's already completely delighted in you because He made you.

THE PROBLEM WITH RELIGION

Religion loves to keep us trapped in the cycle of sin and guilt. It says, "Focus harder, try harder, and you'll stop sinning." But the more you focus on sin, the bigger it looms in your mind. Even Paul, the apostle, admitted that he struggled with sin: "*For I have the desire to do what is good, but I cannot carry it out*" (Romans 7:18). Sound familiar? We've all been there, promising to do better, only to fail five minutes later.


What's the answer? It's not prayer marathons, fasting, accountability partners, or white-knuckled self-discipline. The answer is grace. Struggling against sin is the essence of religion, and religion never works.

DYING TO SIN, LIVING IN GRACE

Grace doesn't magically erase your flesh or its struggles. It frees you from the constant war with it. Deliverance from sin doesn't come from winning battles; it comes from dying to the fight altogether. Grace changes the way you see sin. You realize that it no longer has power over you, not because you've conquered it, but because Christ has.

This is where true freedom begins. When you stop focusing on your failures and start focusing on His grace, you discover something incredible: you're free. Free to live. Free to love. Free to trust that God's got this – even your sin.

From Doubt to Faith: How Studying God’s Sovereignty Transformed James Fine’s Life (as interviewed by Steve Martin)

Steve: Let’s dive into your background, James. Could you tell us about your religious upbringing and journey?

James: Sure. Growing up, my parents didn’t attend church, but my mom was really into Baptist radio preachers. So, we kids were exposed to a lot of radio sermons.

Whenever Billy Graham was on TV, we were made to watch him. I always felt I believed in God and Jesus; I can’t remember a time that I didn’t. When I was 11, my mom took us to a local Baptist church where I was introduced to the concept of hellfire, brimstone, altar calls, and the idea of needing to be “saved.” It was all about avoiding hell.

At 13, I went forward during an “altar call” – not so much because of a deep conviction, but more out of fear. I needed that “fire insurance” to avoid going to hell. I got baptized, but soon after, my mom stopped going to church, and so did we. Throughout my teens, I still considered myself a believer, though I didn’t read the Bible much. I’d still listen to radio preachers and held on to my belief in God.

Steve: That sounds like a lot of people’s experience. How did things change for you later on?


James: Well, when I went to college, I took a class on world religions. The professor, who was probably an atheist, emphasized that Christianity had borrowed heavily from other religions. He made it seem like Christianity was just another myth among many. This really shook my faith. I became what I’d call a “deist.” I believed that some higher power created the universe, but that this being walked away, leaving us to our own devices. This mindset resonated with me, especially after seeing movies like “Star Wars,” where the concept of “the Force” felt closer to what I believed.

I held onto that view for a long time – until I was 47, actually.

Steve: So, what happened at 47 to change your outlook?

James: It was a pivotal moment. A friend who was a Seventh-day Adventist gave me a book about the sovereignty of God. He said, “You’re the way you are because God made you that way.” This idea

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wasn't part of typical Adventist beliefs, but the book opened my eyes to the concept of God's sovereignty. It also discussed universal salvation, the idea that everyone would eventually be saved. Light bulbs went off in my head. I started studying like crazy, devouring anything I could get my hands on. That's when I discovered Clyde Pilkington and the *Bible Student's Notebook*. I immediately felt that this was the truth I had been searching for, and my faith was reignited.

Steve: It sounds like a significant shift. How did your family respond to this new understanding?

James: Not well, unfortunately. I was so enthusiastic that I told my 90-year-old mother and my 70-year-old brother that they weren't "*in the body of Christ*" because they believed in things like the Trinity and eternal torment. At the time, I was following a teacher who claimed that incorrect beliefs excluded someone from being part of "*the body of Christ*." It was a problem because, in my ignorance, I was telling them that, yes, they would ultimately be saved, but they weren't "saved" right now.

Naturally, my brother thought I had lost my mind, and my mother was hurt. So, I stopped discussing my beliefs with them. Both have since passed away. Looking back, I realize that I was wrong to judge their faith based on those criteria. I've since come to understand that we're all on different paths, and being in the "*One Body*" isn't as narrowly defined as I once thought.

Steve: It sounds like you've had a lot of growth since then. What recent studies have you found most

illuminating?

James: One of the most eye-opening revelations was understanding that we are not the problem in God's plan, but part of the solution. Christianity often paints us as hopeless sinners, but discovering that we are the "*complement of Christ*" completely changed my perspective.

It's uplifting to know that we have a role in God's grand design.


Another critical understanding came from diving into Paul's writings. Recognizing the differences between Paul's early epistles and his later ones, like Ephesians and Colossians, is crucial. They present the perfection of God's plan after the Jews rejected the Kingdom in Acts 28:28. This is when the "new ballgame" starts for believers, focusing on our celestial destiny.

For me, the realization that God is sovereign and that we were predestined brought incredible peace.

Steve: You mentioned running a Facebook group. How has that experience been?

James: It's been quite a journey! I started the group, called "Ignorant Brethren of Universal Salvation," when I retired at 62. I couldn't relate to other universal salvation groups because many of them still held onto traditional Christian beliefs like the Trinity and free will. I wanted a space where people could explore universal salvation through the lens of God's total sovereignty.

Why Is There a Need for Forgiveness?

Q: In the book *The Purposes of God* by A.P. Adams, he wrote, “God is responsible for all things as they exist.” He also writes that “God is the cause of all things,” which I believe.

The above said, my question is, why does man need to be forgiven if God is responsible and the cause of all things? Why did Paul say to forgive one another even as Christ has forgiven us, if God is responsible and the cause of ALL things? It seems to me that God is responsible and the cause of all things, sin being one of those things.

I'm just having a hard time reconciling God's responsibility for ALL things and the cause of ALL things, yet man is 100% guilty and needed to be forgiven.

A: I am especially thankful for your insight on the theme of “*forgiveness*.”

A.P. Adams was indeed correct, that “God is responsible for all things as they exist.” I am also thankful that you have laid hold of this *grand* truth of God's sovereignty.

So, to answer your enlightened question, NO, man does NOT need to be forgiven, since clearly God is responsible and the cause of all things! I learned to lay aside religion's “*forgiveness*” soon after I began to leave religion itself.

Actually, Paul did NOT, in fact, teach forgiveness at all. The appearance of “*forgive*,” “*forgiving*,” and “*forgiveness*” in his epistles are simply the mistranslations of man.

The Greek word ἀφεσίς (*aphesis*¹), often translated

“*forgiveness*”, is more properly “*freedom from*.” It is a compound word: “**FROM-LETTING**” (CKC).

*In Whom we have deliverance through His blood, the **freedom from** sins, according to the riches of His grace* (Ephesians 1:7, BSV).

In the primitive view of God in the Old Testament, and in the New Testament until Paul reveals the fulness of the grand truth of “*justification*,” “*forgiveness*” was a merciful ruse, awaiting the advanced revelation of Paul. Instead of “*forgiveness*,” Paul taught that sin is “*justified*,” and thus, we are “*justified*” from “*sin*.”

All “*sin*” will be “*justified*” by God Himself, in His absolute sovereignty, when He reveals in detail His wisdom of placing sin in His story of creation.

It is God alone Who is responsible for *all*. One day, in the resurrection, God will “*justify*” just how all “*sin*” was actually perfect and necessary, so that in the *absolute* sense we will see how there never was any “*sin*” or “*evil*,” since what God has written for all of our lives was perfect – perfect imperfection – and that all “*sin*” and “*evil*,” were but a divine illusion to bring about a contrast, so that our Father could be truly known in the fullness of His absolute wisdom and love.

Ultimate freedom from sin is *far more* than the traditional “*forgiveness*” or “*pardon*.” These are rooted in *guilt*. The followers of religion seek to obtain forgiveness through some means – concerted effort, confessions, prayers, penance, resolutions, etc. What Paul taught went well beyond “*forgiveness*.” The revelation given to him involved “*justification*” which, instead of being rooted in guilt, is rooted in righteousness.

We now have about 1,300 members, and managing the group can be challenging. We get people who come in with their own agendas or those who try to turn the group into a platform for pushing their particular doctrines. But there are also those who join just to learn, and they are why I keep the group going. I get messages from people saying they’re learning so much, and it’s rewarding to see their growth.

Steve: It’s great that you’re creating a space for that kind of exploration.


